Unfortunately we do not have any availability for Tipi Dining on Saturday night due to a private booking

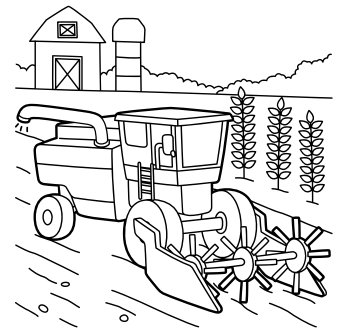


Sunday:

We are working on getting their runs ready as they will be starting to go outside in the next 2 weeks - weather dependent!



RECIPE OF THE WEEK - CAMPFIRE BANANA S'MORE SPILT

Ingredients for one person:

- 1 Banana per person
- Chocolate
- Marshmallows
- Toppings... Crushed up digestives, Ice cream or even squirty cream if you're feeling decadent!
- Tin foil
- Nice hot embers



Method:

1. Cut a slit down the middle of the banana leaving the skin on.
2. Fill the slit in the middle of the Banana with squares of melted chocolate and/or mini marshmallows.
3. Cut out a square of foil large enough to wrap your banana in well.
4. Wrap the Banana well in the foil, make sure there aren't any gaps! (You can do two layers to be sure.)
5. Find the embers in your fire, for this we don't want roaring flames, instead we want the bits of wood that are glowing red.
6. Place the banana parcels right in the embers (use the fire tongs!) and cook for 5-10 minutes depending on the heat of your embers. The banana should be warm and squishy, the chocolate and marshmallow melted but not burnt.
7. Take the banana out of the foil, but be careful it will be hot! Pull apart the sides of the banana and add your chosen toppings, and enjoy!

At Sutton Hoo, near Woodbridge:

Rendlesham Revealed: The Heart of a Kingdom AD 400-800, a new temporary exhibition sharing the story of an Anglo-Saxon royal settlement in Suffolk, the largest of its time known in England. (Sat-Mon)

Thegns of Mercia: Enjoy the sights, sounds and smells of Anglo-Saxon life at Sutton Hoo and experience a weekend full of living history at this special Bank Holiday event.

River Trips from Woodbridge and Orford with Suffolk River Trips:

45 min to 1 hour river trips with commentary (Please check the website for exact dates and trip times as tide dependent)

Woodbridge: Jump aboard Gina from for a cruise on the Deben to get a sailors view of the picturesque town passing the historic site of Sutton Hoo.

Orford: Step on board Tilly from Orford Quay for a cruise on the River Ore, circumnavigating the RSPB reserve, Havergate Island & passing Orford Ness.

Snape: Jump aboard Tilly Too or Hagar from Snape and head out through the narrows towards Iken and take in the beauty of the Suffolk landscape.

Halesworth: Halesworth 800 a fun filled celebration from the Market Place through the Thoroughfare and into the Town Park including Celebration Market | Music | Kids activities | Plays | Face Painting | Parade | Trail | Flags | Dressing Up | Medieval Camp | Archery | Music | Dance | Skate Board Games

Dunwich Heath Summer of Play: Join them for nature play including trails, a sand pattern maker, cairn building, & den building. (Free Entry)

East Pint Beer Fest: sample some of the region's top beers at the annual beer festival by the sea, with live music and family activities across the weekend, this is a modern Beer Fest with a welcome-for-all twist.

Snape Maltings Summer Events: Events every weekend including Sundowners get togethers, Yoga sessions, walks and a programme of world class music, alongside a great shopping venue with plenty of nice eating options.

Framlingham Castle: Medieval Season includes jester workshops, have-a-go archery, storytelling, squire training to lessons in courtly etiquette there will be a different activity each week for children to take part in.

Orford Castle: Celtic Treasures: the Art of the Iron Age at Orford Castle is a special exhibition of selected pieces of fine Celtic metalwork including torcs, brooches, bracelets and metal horse and cart fittings from the Barrow Collection.



WALK OF THE WEEK - EXPLORING THE VILLAGE



Distance: 2.4 miles

Terrain: Tracks, footpaths and country lanes

Easy walking

Ascent 15m

Turn right out of the Fire and Feast track and walk down the road until you see the left turn into Manse Lane, take this. Continue on the road as it winds round fields, this will take you into the village past the Village Hall where we hold pop up pub on the first Friday of each month. At the T junction at the end of Manse lane take a right, you are now walking through the centre of our village. You will pass the old pub 'The Poacher' which is now closed, but once upon a time used to be the village shop and was owned by Chris' Great Grandfather! At the other end of the main street take the turning on the right, this will take you past the church, if there isn't a service or concert going on feel free to stop in! Just after the church, part way down Church Hill you will see a footpath up the bank on your right, take this and go through the kissing gate. Follow the track down the side of the fields (please don't feed any horses over the fence). Go through the gate at the other end (close it behind you!) and then follow the track round to the left. You will then see a woody turning off to the left, over a wooden bridge. Turn down here, this was known by the Mobbs children as Dragons Den! (Don't worry no recent sightings of Deborah Meaden have been reported...) Out the other side of 'Dragons Den' turn right up the hill back on to Swan Green Lane, follow the road round, past the turning you took earlier and back to Fire & Feast!
